As part of our continued effort to resolve appeals through consultation with local governments, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has decided to provide one last opportunity for the appellants to present the scientific and engineering basis for their appeals of the Flood Insurance Rate Map for Richland and Lexington Counties, South Carolina, proposed on September 26, 2000. Michael D. Brown, FEMA's General Counsel, will mediate the process, which is expected to be resolved in approximately 30 days.

While it is important that we bring the mapping process to a close, it is equally important that we be confident in the science and engineering data employed, and that the process leading up to our final determination be fair and equitable. This final opportunity is provided in recognition of the complexity of the technical issues, the impact of FEMA's decision on future development, and to ensure that all available scientific and engineering data are considered in FEMA's final decision.

We have asked appellants to provide a written summary of their case to FEMA by no later than July 5, 2001. On July 24, 2001, a meeting will be held in the FEMA Regional Office in Atlanta, where appellants will present their scientific and engineering data and respond to questions. Within 10 days of the meeting, I will render the Administrator's final determination.

Your continued involvement is a crucial part of the mapping process. As such, we will keep you apprised of issues as they arise and will seek your involvement and input as necessary.
